More than 200 people attend 'State of the Community' event

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A n air of celebration filled the Harry M. Cornell Arts & Entertainment Complex on Wednesday for the first "State of the Community" event held by Joplin city officials.

The 8 a.m. meeting was sold out at \$25 per ticket, which included breakfast and materials such as the city's annual report and a

guide to city finances.

"We wanted to start hosting an annual event like this because we wanted something more than just a 'State of the City' speech,"

Mayor Keenan Cortez told the crowd of more than 200. "The municipal government does a lot, yes, but it's not the whole story. Our community is made up of

so much more than City Hall. That's why today isn't about just the city government. It's about the state of our entire community and celebrating everything we are doing better to make Joplin a better place every single day."

He pointed to Joplin's business climate, the variety of nonprofit organizations serving community needs and health services fueling Joplin's growth. He thanked community leaders for their help.

The mayor also said that the "state of our community is strong and moving forward with momentum" for the future generations of the community.

"City Council has defined clear priorities that guide our work. Public safety

Hopeful Bites: 'We see people needing food'

Group tests new location during city event across street

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Volunteers with Hopeful Bites gave their own community update Wednesday across the street from the Harry M. Cornell Arts & Entertainment Complex just as city officials held their inaugural "State of the Community" event inside.

Grace "Dio" Bennett said volunteers who have been feeding people in front of Joplin City Hall on Main Street for the past three months also have a perspective on what she called the "true state of our city."

"We see people needing food and to an extent needing to know that they're seen, and the city is actively working their best to shut us out," Bennett said. "We are just individuals coming to help people."

The Homeless Coalition of Jasper and Newton Counties, which works to connect people to programs and places where those in need can obtain housing, food, shelter and education through local providers, reported in early December that there were 150 unsheltered people in Joplin that week. Even those with federal housing vouchers cannot find local housing. Members of Hopeful Bites also have said previously that they believe the homeless have been targeted by unfair city ordinance enforcement, and that
