ASPIRE SUBDIVISION | EAST MISSOULA

Controversial project delayed, but not completely stalled

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Despite a federal bribery indictment hanging over the developers and a lawsuit filed by local residents, the controversial 250-unit proposed Aspire Subdivision next to the river in East Missoula could still be built, although it appears to be delayed by as much as three years.

That's according to a presentation made to members of the city council on Wednesday by Dave DeGrandpre, the land use supervisor for the City of Missoula.

He told the city council's Land Use and Planning Committee that "due to the uncertainty from ongoing litigation," the developer, California-based DeNova Homes, has filed a request to push the final plat submittal deadlines back by three years. They were originally supposed to submit the first plat (a map showing each lot) by Dec. 31 of this year, but now they are requesting to have that deadline pushed back to Dec. 31 of 2028.

The Aspire Subdivision is proposed on a 35-acre chunk of former farm land on the west shore of the Clark Fork River in East Missoula, just to the north of Interstate 90.
