## Lenoir-Rhyne sees largest group of new students move in since COVID-19

Lenoir-Rhyne University welcomed its largest group of new students since the COVID-19 pandemic during move-in day on Friday.

The incoming first-year class includes 347 students living on campus. Of those students, 169 are female and 178 are male. The freshmen represent 24 states, with the largest groups from North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia. The fresh-

man class has 16 international students who hail from 11 countries, including Canada, France, Kenya, Mexico and the United Kingdom.

The largest group of new students moved into campus dorms since the COVID-19 pandemic consisted of 827 students.

"Move-in day is one of my favorite days of the year," Lenoir-Rhyne Dean of Students Harry Titus said. "Our campus comes alive with energy, excitement and curiosity. Our Residential Life and Student

Affairs team works tirelessly to make the start of the semester smooth and welcoming for students, and it's incredible to see it all come together."

Students bring a wide range of academic interests, with top intended majors including exercise science, nursing, business administration and sports management. An additional 27 students were undecided on their intended majors.

At Monday night's school board meeting, Hickory City Schools is requesting a the Hickory City Schools Board of Education unanimously passed a non-binding resolution requesting a study on the impact of federal and state funding if school systems in the county consolidate.

"The board of education recognizes its

formation and data-driven decision-making before any significant structural that when we're considering the financial changes to public education governance are considered," a line from the resolution presented at Monday night's meeting said.

Hickory City Schools Superintendent Jennifer Griffin said the study was needed to look at factors beyond school construction costs.

"The resolution is an effort to make sure implications of a merger, we're looking at everything," Griffin said before the meeting. "Not just the impact on capital dollars, but the recurring funding from the state and federal government?

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
