School closes diversity office

Wake Forest's Association of Black Alumni criticizes the move

Wake Forest University has closed its Office of Diversity and Inclusion and reassigned its leader to other duties.

The university's action coincides with the Trump administration withholding federal money from some universities who don't support the administration's opposition of diversity programs, transgender athletes and pro-Palestinian protests.

Jose Villalba, the former vice president for diversity and inclusion and the university's chief diversity officer, informed Wake Forest students and faculty members on Aug. 8 that the office was closed.

Villalba said he was honored to lead

the office since 2018. university's intercultural

Defense: Attorney general's appeal attempt 'meritless'

NC challenging dismissal of convictions in killing of Chris Paul's grandfather

North Carolina Attorney General Jeff Jackson's office has offered no compelling reason for challenging a judge's decision Aug. 8 to throw out decades-old convictions in the 2002 murder of basketball star Chris Paul's grandfather, lawyers argued in a court filing Wednesday.

Brothers Rayshawn Banner and Nathaniel Cauthen are serving life sentences for first-degree murder and robbery with a dangerous weapon in relation to the killing of Nathaniel Jones outside his Winston-Salem home.

The attorney general's office asked the North Carolina Court of Appeals on Tuesday to pause the dismissals while prosecutors pursued an appeal.

"The State asks this Court to prolong


