The Grounds developers seek City Council assistance to access lower-interest bonds

The developers of the \$515 million The Grounds mixed-use development near council's 6 p.m. meeting on Sept. 15. Wake Forest University are making another financial request of Winston-Salem

City Council. This time, The Grounds is requesting the council's assistance in securing up to \$80 million in public finance authority lease revenue bonds.

The bonds would go toward financing the construction of a 130,500-squarefoot Wake Forest University administrative office building project on campus and a parking area.

A public hearing is scheduled for city

"The financing of the costs of the p ect in the city is solely for the purpose of satisfying the authority requirements and the federal tax requirements," according to a legal notice for the bonds.

Council approval "does not constitute an endorsement of the bonds or the projects, does not obligate the city for the payment of the principal or premium or interest of the bonds, does not obligate

the city for the performance of any pledge, mortgage, obligation or agreement of any kind which may be undertaken by the issuer, and does not constitute bonds or any of the agreements or obligations of issuer as an indebtedness of the city."

What council's approval does do is give the developers access to a lower interest rate, according to Tony Plath, a retired finance professor at UNC Charlotte.

"Issuing the requisite debt financing to support the construction of the building
