Owner prepares South Royalton deli for its next phase

SOUTH ROYALTON — To the unknowing passerby walking down Chelsea Street last week, RB's Delicatessen may have looked like a business on its way out of town.

A large dumpster outside the store was filled to the brim with garbage and discarded odds and ends, while inside, Brenda Cohen, the building's owner and RB's original founder, was busy cleaning out the deli with the help of a handful of friends.

"This was overwhelming. There was no way we were going to let (Cohen) tackle it on her own," Mike Barnaby, a Tunbridge resident who's known Cohen since he was a kid, said while using a razor blade to scrape a Monster Energy decal off a store window.

But in spite of appearances, RB's isn't going anywhere. It is, however, getting a new owner. Daisey

Ayotte stands behind new zoning laws

Other bills proposed to address housing crisis

It has been months since Gov. Kelly Ayotte signed a suite of bills intended to help housing construction, but Matt Mayberry says he's already seeing results.

Mayberry, the outgoing president of the New Hampshire Home Builders Association, said Wednesday a slight uptick in the

number of new listings and homes sold in the past month suggests some of those reforms — like a bill creating a 90-day expedited state permitting process for large developers — are working.

"Housing inventory has gone up in New Hampshire, a little bit, and prices have come down a little," he said.

But despite the new laws, many of which prohibit cities and towns from zoning actions that might block new housing, the state's housing affordability cri-

sis continues. And the debate over how to alleviate it is far from settled.

In Concord this week, lawmakers in both parties have sparred over weighty, fundamental questions around who should dictate the pace of housing construction and whether limits should exist over local control. On one side are those who say the state stepped too far into an arena that should be the purview of communities. On the other are those who think the state is holding back and should play a bigger

role in balancing the housing market.

Sailing through the middle of that divide is Ayotte, who has hailed the top-down deregulatory approach of last year's anti-zoning bills. With those now law, the state should sit back and watch how the laws that do exist affect the market, Ayotte argued.

"I think it's very important that we make sure that this legislation that was passed, that we're following up and seeing how it's working

Town hires new fire chief

Move comes following turnover in the department

BRADFORD, Vt. — The Selectboard has appointed a new fire chief after a period of turmoil within the department.

Nate Brooks, who has been

with the Bradford Fire Department for seven years, began a three-year term as chief on Jan. 1 after being recommended by other firefighters.

During his time with the department, Brooks has held every other position, including captain, assistant chief and deputy chief, he said. He previously served 11 years of service at the Woodsville and Newbury

Village fire departments.

The Selectboard started overseeing the fire department, which was previously a self-governed nonprofit, in the spring of 2025. The intention behind this change was to bring the department up to National Fire Association standards regarding training mandates and recordkeep-
