Israeli plan to take Gaza City criticized

Citizens concerned over safety of hostages

JERUSALEM – Israel's security cabinet approved a plan to take control of Gaza City, a move expanding military operations in the shattered Palestinian

territory that drew strong fresh criticism at home and abroad on Aug. 8 over its pursuit of the almost two-year war.

Germany, a key European ally, announced it would halt exports of military equipment to Israel that could be used in Gaza. Britain urged Israel to re-

consider its decision to escalate the Gaza military campaign.

However, President Donald Trump's ambassador to Israel, Mike Huckabee, told Reuters that some countries appeared to be putting pressure on Israel rather than on the militant group Hamas, whose deadly attack on Israel in 2023 ignited the war.

In Israel, families of hostages held by militants in Gaza, and opposition leaders blasted Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu for a decision that they said would put hostages' lives at risk.

Far-right allies in Netanyahu's coalition have been pushing for a total

At 8:30 p.m. on a Thursday in July, the line outside Mokafe in Paterson stretched out the door.

Inside, a crowd of mostly young professionals and college students gathered around plush green chairs with mocha lattes in hand, nibbling on croissants drizzled with chocolate and pistachio.

The din of chatter and a mocha aroma infused the space, as Arabic tunes streamed from speakers.

Maria Ismail, 26, peered at the display of pastries made in-house, pondering what to order. Mokafe hit the spot for nighttime sugar cravings, Ismail said, but it was the vibe that kept her coming back.

"There's an energy," the Teaneck resident said.

"It's the music. There's always laughter. Anyone who walks in knows it's going to be a good time."

Similar scenes are playing out at Mokafe coffee shops across New Jersey and New York, where daytime coffee business gives way to nighttime crowds.

It is one of several coffee chains with a Middle Eastern flair that have burst onto the social scene, providing a festive café environment and an alcoholfree alternative to bars and clubs.

These establishments are bringing a touch of the Middle East to American coffee culture in the flavors they serve and the décor they embrace, while they pour brews with beans imported from Yemen.

After dipping to nearly \$3, gas prices climb again

New Jersey gas prices bounced up in recent weeks — after the average statewide price had nearly dropped below \$3 a gallon — with summer travel picking up and local refinery capacity down.

Figures from travel club AAA show that the average price for a gallon of gas was \$3.08 in New Jersey on Monday, Aug. 4, up from \$3.02 a week earlier but still below the \$3.13 price of a month ago.

As of Aug. 4, West Texas Intermediate Oil, also known as WTI crude oil—the most common oil in the U.S.—was trading at \$66.56 a barrel, down from \$70 a barrel on July 30 but still up from \$58.07 in early May.

Whether prices head up or down depends on demand for gasoline and availability, which is affected by oil production and capacity at the refineries that service much of the Northeast.

Summer demand waned in the weeks after the July Fourth weekend, with people "taking shorter trips, or staying put once they get to their destinations," but it has recently picked up,
