hen Elizabeth Dalzell's daughter Liesl complained of severe pain in her left shoulder in June by using sign language, it began a nearly monthlong odyssey through New Jersey's health care system before the young woman with multiple disabilities received the care she needed — a routine cortisone shot. • During that time, an urgent care provider balked at giving Liesl an X-ray because she moved too much. An orthopedist asked Dalzell if her daughter would get "all weird" during an examination. 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Carteret awards \$47M ferry terminal construction contract

CARTERET – The borough is looking to break ground in December 2025 on the \$47 million Carteret Multimodal Ferry Terminal after the contract was awarded to a Morris County firm.

The borough recently awarded Brockwell & Carrington Contractors of Towaco the contract to construct the multi-level building after the project received long-awaited federal and state approvals.

The borough accepted three bids for the project, which is expected to take 18-24 months to construct following the groundbreaking.
