Nonpartisan races can end in primaries

Las Vegas Councilwoman Nancy Brune and a handful of other candidates appear poised for outright victories after incomplete election results showed each receiving more than 50 percent of the vote in their respective races.

Meanwhile, Henderson Mayor Michelle Romero was flirting with outright victory but had fallen just below the threshold after Clark County released a new batch numbers Thursday night.

"I look forward to seeing the final results and to hopefully being lucky enough to continue serving the city I love so much," Romero told the Las Vegas Review-Jour-

Several races tight as counts continue

Drew Johnson and Jeff Carter continued to battle it out to be the Republican candidate for Nevada treasurer about 24 hours after polls closed in Tuesday's primaries.

Johnson was ahead by about 1,828 votes as of 8 p.m. Wednesday, though statewide results did not reflect updated Clark County ballot counts. The winner is likely to face Tya Mathis-Coleman, who is leading Joe Dalia in a four-way Democratic primary.

Early Wednesday evening, Johnson expressed optimism that he would advance to November's midterms.

"I'm honored by the support I got throughout the state," he told the Las Vegas Review-Journal on Wednesday. "The grass-

roots support that I've had has really paid off; it means a lot to me."

Just over 400,000 Nevadans voted in the primaries, or about 19 percent of registered voters, according to the secretary of

Woman abused duck on Strip, LV police say

A Las Vegas woman was arrested after police accused her of jumping into The Venetian fountain on the Strip, grabbing a duck named Daffy and abusing it.

Destiny Reyes, 29, was booked at the Clark County Detention Center on two felony counts of willfully maiming or torturing an

animal.

A Metropolitan Police Department arrest report for Reyes shows that she was taken into custody after Venetian security called police, reporting that a woman had jumped into the fountain pool at 1:29 p.m. Tuesday and grabbed a female juvenile duck named Daffy. Police said they then
