NY program funds 200 premade starter homes

Up to 200 new houses will crop up around New York at rock-bottom prices over the next year through a new state program that's funding a batch of modular starter homes.

The ranch-style, factory-built homes will be installed on vacant lots in as many as 15 communities and marketed at prices ranging from \$170,000 to \$210,000, state officials say. Eligible to buy them are peo-

ple earning between 70% and 130% of the How NY's new modular median income levels for their areas.

Gov. Kathy Hochul announced the launch of the MOVE-IN NY program on Monday, Sept. 22, pitching it as a promising new approach to ease the struggles of first-time buyers and downsizing older couples in the midst of a brutal housing market.

"This groundbreaking initiative has the potential to revolutionize the way we create high-quality, beautifully designed starter homes in New York," she said in a statement.

home program works

The state commissioned three modular homes in Syracuse, Schenectady and the town of Newcomb in Essex County as a test for the new program. That pilot demonstrated they could be manufactured and installed within six months, just a third of the time it takes to build a house from the ground up. Each cost about \$250,000 to build, compared to

Schuyler **County** crash kills teen, injures driver

A Tompkins County teen was killed, and another was injured in a one-vehicle crash Sept. 29 in the Schuyler County Town of Hector.

The crash took place around 11:46a.m. Monday on County Road No. 1 in Hector, according to the Schuyler County Sheriff's Office.

Arriving deputies located a 2010 Ford Fusion that failed to negotiate a curve, left the roadway and struck some trees, the sheriff's office said.

The driver of the vehicle, 18-yearold Michael Blake, of Ithaca, was taken by helicopter to Upstate Medical Center in Syracuse for treatment of his injuries. A passenger in the Fusion, 17year-old Marcus Knight, of Trumansburg, was pronounced deceased at the scene.

The Schuyler County Coroner's Office, Trumansburg Fire Department, Enfield Fire Department, Trumansburg Ambulance, and New York State Police accident reconstruction team assisted at the scene.

The crash remains under investigation by the Schuyler County Sheriff's Office.
