# Seinfeld returns to Binghamton

## Tickets go on sale Dec. 19

A big name is returning to the Broome County Forum Theatre in 2026, marking his fourth time stopping in Binghamton.

On Dec. 12, the theatre announced actor and comedian Jerry Seinfeld will be returning to Binghamton next year, and tickets will go on sale starting at 10 a.m. Dec. 19.

If you're interested in going to the show, here are the details.

### When will Jerry Seinfeld be in Binghamton?

Jerry Seinfeld will be at the Broome County Forum Theatre, located at 236 Washington St. in Binghamton, on April 24, 2026.

The show begins at 7 p.m. Lobby doors open at 6 p.m.

### How to purchase tickets for Jerry Seinfeld show in Binghamton

Tickets go on sale at 10 a.m. Dec. 19, and can be purchased on Ticketmaster or in person at the Mirabito Box Office, located at the Visions Veterans Memorial Arena, 1 Stuart St., Binghamton. A presale is scheduled for 10 a.m. Dec. 17 at 10 a.m. through Dec. 18 at 10 p.m., according to Ticketmaster.

Box office ticket pricing ranges from \$73 to \$403. Tickets are required for all ages and there is an eight ticket limit.

### 'Seinfeld' was most successful comedy series in television history

Seinfeld's comedy career took off after his first appearance on "The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson"

in 1981.

Eight years later, he teamed with fellow comedian Larry David to create what was to become the most successful comedy series in the history of television: "Seinfeld." The show ran on NBC for nine seasons, winning numerous Emmy, Golden Globe and People's Choice awards, and was named the greatest television show of all time in 2009 by TV Guide.

"Seinfeld" was identified in 2012 as the best sitcom ever in a 60 Minutes/Vanity Fair poll.

### 2026 show is Seinfeld's fourth in Binghamton

Seinfeld's 2026 show will be his fourth time stopping in Binghamton, all at the forum theatre, with the first one being in 2014.

In 2018, only one show was scheduled initially, but a second show was added due to such a high demand. Seinfeld also had a pair of shows here in 2023.

# NYPA scales back renewable energy plan

Blames changes on Trump-GOP reductions in federal tax credits

The New York Power Authority plans to develop, own and operate dozens of renewable energy projects in 2026, among them a solar farm on a shuttered Albany landfill and energy storage systems in Westchester County.

NYPA's updated renewables plan, unveiled at its monthly meeting in White Plains on Dec. 9, includes 39 solar arrays, three wind projects and some 150 battery systems that store energy until it's needed for the grid during times of peak demand. Nearly all of those are in Westchester County and New York City.
