Kingston man charged in child sex abuse case

KINGSTON - State police have accused a Kingston man of sexually abusing a child following an investigation.

According to state police, that investigation began March 21, after they received a report that Tobias A. Buchanan, 25, of Kingston, allegedly engaged in sexual contact with a child less than 17 years old.

Buchanan was arrested May 20 and charged with third-degree rape, a felony; and sexual misconduct, first-degree unlawfully dealing with a child and two counts of endangering the welfare of a child, all misdemeanors.

Buchanan was arraigned in Town of Ulster Court and sent to Ulster County Jail in lieu of \$15,000 cash bail, \$50,000 bond or \$100,000 partially secured bond, pending further action in Kingston City Court.

The name of his attorney was not immediately available.

State police said the investigation is continuing.

The site was listed on the National Register of Historic Places as Cottage in the Pines in 2015.

NY budget includes ICE limits, insurance changes

A New York state budget bill focused on immigration enforcement restrictions and reducing car insurance costs was passed before lawmakers headed home for the Memorial Day weekend.

The Public Protection and General Government, or PPGG, bill, which includes some of the hotly debated immigration and car insurance-related policy changes in the state budget, faced questioning by Republican lawmakers on Thursday, May 21, before the measure passed both the Senate and Assembly.

"The number one responsibility in government is to keep its citizens safe," Assemblymember Phil Palmesano, R-Corning, said when talking

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
