## Vaccines urged as flu season nears

ALBANY — Flu season is upon us. But infectious disease experts say it's not too late to get vaccinated ahead of the winter holidays.

This week, state Health Commissioner Dr. James McDonald said that influenza is now "prevalent" across New York, with hospitals reporting sharp spikes in cases and hospitalizations of people with severe respiratory symptoms. Lab-confirmed flu cases are doubling weekover-week as peak season approaches, state data show.

Yet vaccination levels

remain low as vaccine skepticism is on the rise. Across New York, just 21% of adults and 20% of children have gotten this year's flu shot. Vaccination levels in the Capital District and across the Hudson Valley are on par with the state average.

Flu vaccines typically take a few weeks to reach full protection, meaning there is still plenty of time to vaccinate before the holidays, said Dr. Danielle Wales, primary care physician with Albany Med Internal Medicine and Pediatrics.

While the virus is not yet widespread locally, doctors are starting to see signs that cases are on the

Trump seeks to deny citizenship to children of illegal immigrants

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court agreed on Friday to take up the constitutionality of President Donald Trump's order on birthright citizenship declaring that children born to parents who are in the United States illegally or temporarily are not American citizens.

The justices will hear Trump's appeal of a lower-court ruling that struck down the citizenship restrictions. They have not taken effect anywhere in the country.

The case will be argued in the spring. A definitive ruling is expected by early summer.

The birthright citizenship order, which Trump signed Jan. 20, the first day of his second term, is part of his Republican administration's broad immigration crackdown. Other actions include immigration enforcement surges in several cities and the first peacetime invocation of the 18th-century Alien Enemies

The administration is facing multiple court challenges, and the high court has sent mixed signals in emergency orders it has issued. The

## Albany Med makes change in leadership

McKenna out as entrepreneur Pickett named CEO, president

ALBANY — A day after the Albany Med Health System announced a significant leadership change, very little is publicly known about what prompted the sudden exit of CEO Dr. Dennis P. McKenna in favor of the system's board chair and local entrepreneur Daniel T. Pickett III.

Albany Med Health System, which operates Albany Medical Center, Albany Medical College and three other local hospitals, announced late Thursday afternoon that Pickett was replacing McKenna, immediately, as president and CEO.

"The board decided Albany Med Health System requires new leadership and made this decision only after extensive deliberation and with the system's long-term stability in mind," Albany Med Health System spokesman Matthew Markham told the Times Union on Friday. "It reflects a clear-eyed assessment of what will best position the system for long-term success."
