'IF YOU BUILD IT, THEY WILL COMÉ'

Aligned Data Centers breaks ground on it's new facility in Coshocton

CONESVILLE - Local officials and incoming business management are high on a partnership that is leading to major local development that will bring 1,500 temporary and 30 full-time jobs.

Aligned Data Centers announced it bought property at the Conesville Industrial Park in May. It began construction of a facility and substations in July after Coshocton Port Authority received a \$58.7 million grant from the All Ohio Future Fund for utility upgrades, building an access road and expanding water and sewer lines from the City of Coshocton.

The cost of the project was not readily available, but Aligned previously called it a multibillion-dollar investment. The company bought 197 aces within the industrial park for approximately \$40.5 million, per records from the Coshocton County Auditor's Office..

A groundbreaking was held Sept. 30 at the site. Aligned estimates it will be operational in the second half of 2026. It's estimated between 1,500 to 1,800

workers will be needed for the construction. Approximately 30 full-time employees will work at the site once completed, with 20 in operations and 10 in security. Different customers would have employees at the facility too.

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JUDGE TO TRUMP:

Foreign students have free speech rights

Ruling comes in case on 'targeted' deportations

A federal judge has ruled against the Trump administration's efforts to revoke the legal status of pro-Palestinian students and activists, saying top leaders violated their right to free speech.

U.S. District Court Judge William G. Young in Boston found the actions were taken by the departments of State and Homeland Security "to strike fear" into other students with similar pro-Palestinian views, and they had the effect of "pro-actively (and effectively) curbing lawful pro-Palestinian speech."

Young sided with groups representing university faculty, finding that the administration sought to "target noncitizen pro-Palestinians for deportation primarily on account of their First Amendment protected political speech."

Young, who was appointed by President Ronald Reagan, opened his Sept. 30 opinion with a scrapbook-style copy of a threatening, handwritten
