\$1M challenge met for Nuxhall Foundation

Matching gift will allow foundation to break ground for Hope Center in 2026.

The Hope Center, a project years in the making, will break ground in 2026 after a first-time Nuxhall Foundation donor makes major matching gift.

Hatton Foundation Executive Director Walt Lunsford announced at the Miracle Ball in October a \$1 million matching gift to construct the 31,000-square-

foot indoor recreational facility planned for the Joe Nuxhall Miracle League Fields campus in Fairfield.

And they matched every dol-

lar, and then some.

More than \$1.25 million was donated by the Wednesday deadline toward the Nuxhall Foundation project, which brings the

capital campaign total to more than \$6.6 million, enough to start construction.

The total campaign has a \$12 million goal, with \$10 million needed for construction and \$2 million for a maintenance and operational endowment, according to The Nuxhall Foundation.

"This overwhelming total was a team effort from a community of givers who get why our mission matters – and more importantly, they realize that The Hope Center is a dream worth believing in," said Kim Nuxhall, president and board chairman of The Nuxhall Foundation.

Hospital stays for flu quickly rising in Ohio

Health officials: New strain from Australia may be contributing to increasing number of hospitalizations.

Hospitalizations due to flu in the region and nationally are climbing rapidly and in some cases doubling or tripling historical averages, according to the Ohio Department of Health.

For the week ending Dec. 27, 1,465 Ohioans were hospitalized due to the flu, up from 745 the prior week and more than double the historical average of 665.

A 16-year-old Beavercreek girl was the state's first pediatric flu-related death of the season, ODH Director Dr. Bruce Vanderhoff reported on Dec. 31.

Ohio typically has between 1 and 7 pediatric flu-related deaths per year according to the state.

Greene County had 30 people hospitalized for the flu during the week ending Dec. 27, more than triple the 9 from the prior week.

Justice Department indicted Maduro for cocaine, corruption

He's accused of allowing shipment of thousands of tons of cocaine into U.S.

NEW YORK – A newly unsealed U.S. Justice Department indictment accuses captured Venezuelan President Nicolás Maduro of running a "corrupt, illegitimate government" fueled by an extensive drug-trafficking oper-

ation that flooded the U.S. with thousands of tons of cocaine.

The arrest of Maduro and his wife, Cilia Flores, in a stunning military operation early Saturday in Venezuela sets the stage for a major test for U.S. prosecutors as they seek to secure a conviction in a Manhattan courtroom against the longtime leader of the oil-rich South American nation.

Speaking to reporters hours after Maduro's capture, President Donald Trump revealed his plans to exploit the leadership void to "fix" the country's oil infrastructure and sell "large amounts" of oil to other countries.
