## Kendall Wild writes book about her alpaca

CANAL WINCHESTER – Kendall Wild has a special friend in an alpaca named Lacee. So much so that she’s authored and published a children’s book about their relationship.

Titled “Lacee Finds a Friend,” the 16-year-old Bloom-Carroll High School sophomore finished the book in November. Her grandfather, David Ray, drew the illustrations. In addition to large print, the book features Braille printing so the visually impaired can also enjoy it. The illustrations are also in Braille.

Kendall said Lacee has albinism, which is a skin pigment condition, and also cannot hear and has vision problems. Lacee is 10-years-old, and Kendall said alpacas live to about 20. Kendall is the 2025 Fairfield County Fair Alpaca Ambassador and has shown Lacee at the Fairfield County Fair and the Ohio State Fair.

The Clovernook Center is the book’s publisher.

“Clovernook is the largest producer of Braille in the country,” Kendall said. “They got a grant from Scripps Howard to write books. And they only wanted to do books from people who had disabilities. It’s all about how me and Lacee have worked together and how Lacee was kind of lonely and wanted a 4-Her to show her.”

Kendall said she wants others with disabilities to not let those disabilities stop them from reaching their goals. Kendall has autism, low-muscle tone, attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and anxiety.

“So it was kind of easy to work with Lacee because she has disabilities and I have disabilities,” Kendall said. “And I know what’s it like to have disabilities. So I thought, why not have a friend that also has disabilities? And be able to connect with her and work with her.”

She said Lacee has helped her overcome some of her own disabilities.

“I used to not really like to talk to anybody at the farm,” Kendall said. “But through working with Lacee, I’ve had to talk to people, and it helps me to open up and talk to others at the farm.”

Kendall said her book is selling well. “We’ve already sold quite a few of the books,” she said. “I’ve done several book signings around Canal Winchester to

promote my book and I had a lot of people buy them there as well.”

Kendall said it took her a couple of months to write the book, but that putting the Braille in the book was the longest part of the process.

After writing her first book, does Kendall see a second book in her future?

“I don’t know,” she said. “Not right now, I’m not thinking about anything. But maybe in the future I would write something. I just don’t know right now.”

Kendall’s mother, Tiffany Wild, helped with the book’s production.

“I’m just so proud of her and the impact she’s had on kids who have disabilities that can relate to her,” she said. “I’m also very proud that she’s not afraid to talk about her disabilities and be a role model for those with disabilities in the community. With all she’s accomplished in such a short time, we’re all very, very proud of her.”

## Ohio’s gun laws: What to know

Carrying is prohibited in certain locations

Over the past 30 years, Ohio legislators have gradually expanded gun rights, including where adults are allowed to legally carry firearms.

Ohio has long been an open-carry state, allowing people to carry their weapons in plain view, and in 2022, Gov. Mike DeWine signed a law that wiped out required training and background checks for carrying concealed weapons.

That doesn’t mean that people can legally carry guns everywhere, all the time.

### Who can buy guns in Ohio?

The general requirements for gun buyers are:

- must be 21 or older,
- can’t have a felony conviction or have been adjudicated as mentally incompetent,
- can’t be a fugitive under indictment,
- can’t have a domestic violence conviction and can’t be dependent on illegal drugs or alcohol.

You can buy a long gun starting at age 18. Under federal law, you must be 21 to buy a handgun from a licensed dealer, though some state legislators want to change that.

### Where are you allowed to carry a firearm in Ohio?

You can carry a gun in lots of places in Ohio: rest areas along highways, public sidewalks, restaurants that serve alcohol as long as you’re not drinking, state parks except for most buildings and RV parks.

Unless a prohibition is posted, you can carry in airports before security lines, private businesses, workplaces, arenas and hotels.
