



ack in 2008, The Atlantic sparked controversy with a provocative cover story: Is Google Making Us Stupid? • In that 4,000-word essay, later expanded into a book, author Nicholas Carr suggested the answer was yes, arguing that technology such as search engines was worsening Americans' ability to think deeply and retain knowledge. • At the core of Carr's concern was the idea that people no longer needed to remember or learn facts when they could instantly look them up online. Here are five takeaways from the meeting:

1. Council appoints president pro tem, prepares for new appointee

After the resignation of Mike Neff resigned on Aug. 19, City Council is left with eight members until the Republican Party appoints a person to replace Neff.

With Neff's resignation, council was tasked with voting in a new president pro tempore. Should there be an absence or vacancy in the council president seat, the president pro tempore would fill that seat.

Redmon and Niederkohr take a step up in Marion Fire Department

Two Marion City Fire Department employees have been promoted, and for both the milestone is something they've looked forward to for a long time

Ryan Redmon was promoted from captain to assistant chief and Aaron Niederkohr was promoted from training captain to suppression captain on Monday, Aug. 25.

Redmon has served the department since 2013. When he started at the department, he didn't intend to become a supervisor. But that changed in 2015.

While fighting a fire downtown, a

two-story cinder block wall fell on Redmon, breaking both legs. He was off the job for nearly a year.

"When I came back, I wanted to make sure that never happened to somebody else," Redmon said. "That was kind of my mission. That's my goal."

Niederkohr began his time at the department in 2010, following the footsteps of his stepfather. He said now, he's ready to get to work.

"It's a shift in responsibility and a big responsibility," Niederkohr said. "I'm looking forward to growing our team and just getting better with them and myself."
