LOUISVILLE – An electric steel company plans to renovate and transform the former Allegheny Technologies (ATI) plant and bring with it more than

200 full-time manufacturing jobs to the city. Flux Steel Works announced on Sept. 15 that it will make grain-oriented electrical steel, a material used to make power transformers, at the site at 1500 W. Main St. The company said after a period of

construction and adding new equipment to the site, the plant at full production will make more than 260,000 tons of grain-oriented electrical steel per year. Flux Steel Works did not provide a

Amid warnings from artificial intelligence developers that AI could destroy humanity, potential Democratic presidential candidates are calling for increased federal regulation and criticizing President Donald Trump’s dismissal of concerns about the fast-changing technology. Gavin Newsom, who has signaled interest in running, called on the federal government to “step forward with robust, national regulations that match the urgency of this moment” on Sept. 9 after signing bills to create a framework for independent third-party evaluations of AI systems, set standards for AI auditors and

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
