Ziss set to be mayor of Maumee

Council meeting tackles changes in leadership

Maumee Councilman Chelsea Ziss was elected president of council at a special meeting Wednesday morning.

On Monday she will ascend to the mayor's office upon the retirement of Mayor James MacDonald.

The surprising turn of events followed Mr. MacDonald's announcement on Sunday that he intended to resign effective Dec. 1. Then-city council President Gabe Barrow was expected to become mayor, per Maumee's rules of may-



Barrow resigned as council president. He will, however, keep his seat as a councilman. Council then voted Ms. Ziss in as its president.

Ms. Ziss was appointed to council in August to fill the seat left vacant by the resignation of former Councilman Scott Noonan.

ABORTION PILL ACCESS IN OHIO

Lawmakers weigh more restrictions

COLUMBUS — Legislation that would make it more difficult for Ohioans to obtain abortion drugs and other medications has been approved by the Ohio House.

During a marathon session last week, state lawmakers voted 60-28 along party lines to pass House Bill 324, with Republicans supporting the measure.

"While telehealth offers greater access and convenience, it can fall short for

patients taking high-risk medications," said state Rep. Adam Mathews (R., Lebanon), a primary cosponsor of the legislation. "H.B. 324 works to ensure Ohioans receive appropriate medical supervision, reducing preventable harm even as telehealth contin-

ues to expand." The Patient Protection Act requires a patient being prescribed a medication with at least a 5 percent chance of "severe adverse


