Massillon-based MCTV expanding fiber in Wayne

As Wayne County adds housing, attracts advanced manufacturing and builds out its workforce, one of its long-time service providers is laying the digital foundation to keep pace.

MCTV, founded in Massillon in 1965 and serving Wooster since the 1970s, is in the middle of a nearly decade-long project to replace its coaxial cable system with fiber lines that run directly to the home. The investment, branded Excellerate Fiber, is expected to cost more than \$100 million. By 2027, MCTV plans to have all 95,000 homes it serves in Wayne and Stark counties connected.

"This is about making sure our communities are ready for the future," said Katherine Gessner, president of MCTV. "Wayne County has done a good job of keeping its agricultural base while also attracting advanced manufacturing. Those companies, and the families moving here, need robust internet. Fiber makes that possible."

'Spanish community is Mexican-themed boutique, grocery store opens downtown

MASSILLON – A new Mexican-themed boutique and grocery store has popped up downtown.

MEX-USA Latin store is a family-operated business that has been open on-and-off over the past few weeks at 167 Lincoln Way E, which is the former home of Howard's Tiger Rags.

The main business sign was hung on the storefront in late August, allowing MEX-USA to have more visibility and schedule specific hours and days of operation. Co-owner Denisse Paez said providing a steady income for her three children and having a store tailored toward local Latinos were main reasons for opening the shop. There are more than 10,500 Hispanic or Latino residents in Stark County, according to the U.S. Census Bureau.

"The Spanish community is growing," said Paez, who runs MEX-USA with her son, Felipe Garcia-Paez. "I think people will be glad we're here, when they see we're open and know more (about the store.)"

Feds warn Ohio about funding cuts over pronouns

President Donald Trump's administration is threatening to cut federal funding if Ohio's youth prisons don't remove references to transgender people from sexual education materials.

Trump's Department of Health and Human Services warned Ohio and 39 other states that they had 60 days to remove any references to gender ideology from their Personal Responsibility Education Program materials.

The program, created by former President Barack Obama's Affordable Care Act, aims to educate young people on abstinence and contraception to prevent pregnancy and sexually
