## Trump murder attempt probe continues

## Year marked by changes at Secret Service but questions still remain

WASHINGTON — In many ways, the assassination attempt against Donald Trump at a Pennsylvania campaign stop was a perfect storm of failings coming together that allowed 20-yearold Michael Thomas Crooks to climb on top of a nearby building and take eight shots at the once and future president.

One attendee was killed, two others wounded and a bullet grazed Trump's ear before a Secret Service counter sniper opened fire on Crooks and killed him. That day jolted an already chaotic race for the White House and solidified Trump's iconic status in his party and beyond.

It also became a turning point for the agency tasked with protecting the president. As more details emerged about what went wrong, questions multiplied: What happened to the Secret Service's planning? Why was a rooftop with a clear line of sight to Trump left unguarded? What motivated the shooter?

## Trump observes one-year anniversary at FIFA Club World Cup final Sunday

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J President Donald Trump on Sunday marked the one-year anniversary of a failed attempt on his life, joining family, friends and close advisers to witness Chelsea's dominating FIFA Club World Cup final victory over Paris Saint-Ger-

The president joined the players on the field after the match to congratulate the tournament's outstanding performers, present PSG players with their runner-up medals and hand Chelsea its championship trophy.

"It was an upset today I guess," Trump told reporters after flying back to Washington following Chelsea's victory "But it was a great match."

Trump and first lady Melania Trump were greeted with cheers as they arrived at MetLife Stadium just ahead of the pre-match performance by

## Coroner: Girl, 12, dead after off-road vehicle accident

SHAMOKIN TOWNSHP — A 12-year-old girl was pronounced dead following an accident involving an off-road vehicle in Shamokin Township on Saturday evening, according to Northumberland County Coroner James Kelley.

The accident occurred at approximately 7:30 p.m. The girl was pronounced dead at 8:58 p.m. at a property located at 335 Ash Road, Shamokin Township, Kelley said.

Kelley said the cause of death would not be released until the family was provided full details of the incident.

Kelley described the off-road vehicle as a UTV, or a utility task vehicle.

The accident occurred near the property on a trail off Reitz Road in Shamokin Township.
