

Advocates say program affected by HHS chaos

Soon, 2,983 names will be read aloud at what was Ground Zero on Sept. 11, 2001. Similarly solemn ceremonies will remember those lost 24 years ago in the terrorist attacks at the World Trade Center, the Pentagon and in Shanks-ville, Pennsylvania.

Speeches and prayers will likely include pledges to "never forget."

Meanwhile, the World Trade Center Health Program flounders, advocates warn, as 9/11 responders continue to die from the toxic exposures at Ground Zero. Survivors, including those who lived, worked or went to school in Lower Manhattan, face similar illnesses.

The WTC Health Program, established as part of the James Zadroga 9/11 Health and Compensation Act of 2010, offers screenings and treatments for diseases and disorders classified as caused by exposures on Sept. 11, 2001, and the months after.

A submitted land development plan was brought up for discussion with the commission for further input, though no action was yet taken on the proposal

Unless a request for an extension is filed, the current deadline for council to act on the submitted plans is Dec. 2,

2025, according to the agenda.

The fuel centers operated by Weis Markets allow the grocery store's shoppers to use their store membership cards towards discounts on gas, according to the company's website.

The north Hanover Weis Markets has been located at the site of 860 Carlisle Street since 1964, according to a

review of newspaper records.

Prior to relocating in 1964, the north

Hanover Weis Markets, which first opened in 1950, was located at 715 Carlisle Street in Hanover, roughly a block

A second location of Weis, located in Penn Township, opened in 1982 at 1047 Baltimore Street and then moved to 1400 Baltimore Street in 2015.
