ISRAELI HOSTAGES, PALESTINIAN PRISONERS FREED, BUT COMPLEX ISSUES REMAIN FOR ISRAEL-HAMAS AGREEMENT

WASHINGTON - On Monday, the fragile ceasefire in Gaza led to freedom for Israeli hostages and the release of Palestinian prisoners held by Israel. It was the culmination of a long and tortuous process — but it may, in the end, have been the

"The first steps to peace are always the hardest," President Donald Trump said as he stood with foreign leaders in Egypt on Monday for a summit on Gaza's future. He hailed the ceasefire deal he brokered between Israel and Hamas as the end of the war in Gaza — and start of rebuilding the devastated territory.

Hostage from Pittsburgh's 'sister city' released

You are not alone," a sign reads. The piano is a tribute to Alon Ohel, a talented pianist abducted by Hamas during the Nova music festival in Israel on Oct. 7, 2023.

Shortly after Mr. Ohel was kidnapped, his mother installed a yellow piano in Tel Aviv's hostage

Cities around the world followed suit — including Pittsburgh.

Mr. Ohel's mother was encouraging people to play the piano as a way to reach him and send positive vibes while he was in captivity.

Two years later, he and the remaining 19 other living hostages taken by Hamas were released on Monday, along with hundreds of Palestinian prisoners held by Israel as part of a ceasefire deal.

Kim Salzman, the Jewish Federation of Greater Pittsburgh's Israel and overseas director who lives in the same region as Mr. Ohel, said it was a "really emotional day."

"It has brought tears to almost every Israeli and to every Jew around the world because we wouldn't be complete until all of the hostages are home," Ms. Salzman told the

Impasse triggers layoffs in counties

Westmoreland furloughs 125 workers, seeks loan

Westmoreland County, which will furlough 125 of its 1,600 employees on Tuesday because of the state budget debacle, is one of six Pennsylvania counties in the process of seeking a loan under a new program run by state Treasurer Stacy Garrity,

according to county and treasury officials.

Billions of dollars in state payments to counties and other organizations have stopped flowing because political leaders in Harrisburg have been unable to agree on a budget for a 2025-26 fiscal year that is now 105 days old.

Besides the six counties, other entities that are in the process of seeking loans under the program include 39 Pre-K counts programs, 15 Head Start programs and two rape crisis and domestic violence centers, according to Deputy Treasurer for Communications Steve Chizmar.

But some Democrats in the Legislature have said Ms. Garrity — a Republican and her party's endorsed candidate in next
