

Five seats up for grabs with majority at stake

The candidates for Luzerne County Council have individually minimized the importance of their political parties during the general election campaign.

Yet the county Democratic and Republican parties and outside groups have been spending thousands of dollars to help the parties win control of county council.

Democrats only have to win two of the five seats up in Tuesday's election to regain the majority on council for the first time since 2019. County council currently has a Learn about the candidates: Read 7-4 Republican majority, and all five council seats on Tuesday's ballot are held by Republicans.

Various officials last week denounced campaign fliers mailed by the Republican and Democratic parties. State + Local Election Alliance based in Washington D.C. has also mailed at least five fliers promoting the five Democrats running for county council.

according to campaign finance reports. DemocracyFIRST, also based Washington D.C., has contributed more than \$55,000 to the Luzerne County Democratic Committee since July, reports show.

Northeast Leadership Fund, a political committee based in Plains Twp., contributed \$10,000 in October to Luzerne County Leaders, a committee supporting Republicans running for county council, and \$2,500 in September to the committee for Democratic candidate Steven Coslett.

Outside Democratic groups started showing an interest in county elections in recent years because of election issues, Luzene County Democratic Chairman Thomas Shubilla said.

Trump administration: SNAP will be partially funded in November

PROVIDENCE, R.I. -President Donald Trump's administration said Monday that it will partially fund SNAP for November, after two judges issued rulings requiring the government to keep the nation's largest food aid program running.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture, which oversees cover about half the normal the Supplemental Nutrition benefits.

Assistance Program, had planned to freeze payments potentially sets the stage for a starting Nov. 1 because it said it could no longer keep funding it during the federal government shutdown. Mass murderer George Banks dies at 83

Gained notoriety in 1982 when he killed 13 people, including 5 of his own children

Infamous mass murderer George Banks, who slaughtered 13 people including five of his own children, has died in state prison at the age of 83, according to the Pennsylva-

nia Department of Corrections.



Banks

Banks, who was serving life in prison after being deemed by the courts too mentally ill to be executed, died of natural causes on Sunday

at State Correctional Institution at Phoenix in Montgomery County, DOC spokeswoman Maria Bivens Banks gained notoriety on Sept. 25, 1982, when he murdered 13

people in what at the time represented the second-deadliest mass shooting in United States history. Prosecutors said Banks had been drinking and taking prescription drugs when he used an AR-15 assault rifle to initiate the rampage

by killing eight people at his home at 28 Schoolhouse Lane in Wilkes-

The victims at that location included three women, all mothers to his children, as well as five children, four of whom were his own.

While wearing camouflage fatigues, Banks then left the house

Northwest Area on verge of 'shutdown'

SHICKSHINNY - A rural, Northeastern Pennsylvania school district could "shut down" entirely if the state-budget impasse continues another three months - and news of this drastic action comes as the same district also considers closing its intermediate school as

part of consolidation efforts. Superintendent Joseph Long said after the Oct. 23 school board meeting that the Northwest Area School District would seriously consider shutting down Jan. 31 if the General Assembly fails to adopt a state budget by that time. In an email Monday, Long said the district would do a holistic review on its situation before taking any action, but affirmed that a shutdown would mean a complete halt to all school operations in Northwest Area.

"All factors will be carefully
