City man charged in Freeland homicide

Provided transportation to one of the other suspects, police allege

A Hazleton man has been charged in a Freeland shooting that caused the death of an 18-year-old man and injured a 15-year-old early Tuesday in the borough.

Edgar Polanco, 24, is charged with conspiracy to commit criminal homicide as both a principal and accomplice after police determined he provided transportation to one of the other suspects in the shooting.

At approximately 2:22 a.m. Freeland police were called to the Fly Monkey Vape Shop located at 513 Centre St., for reports of shots fired and people running in the street. Upon their arrival, no one was found in the area but numerous shell casings were discovered on the ground.

Shortly after, the Hazle Twp. Fire Company was working a fire in Forest Hills Acres when they were approached by a 2012 Honda Odyssey. The driver informed the fire personnel that he had multiple gunshot victims in his vehicle. Those victims were later identified as Jonas de Jesus Rodriguez and Rafiel Sanz, who was later pronounced deceased.

Through security camera footage provided by American Legion Post 473 located directly north of the vape shop and separated by a small alley, State Police at
