PPG to lay off 1,800 after shaky 3rd quarter

Pittsburgh-based paint maker says it will sell architectural coatings unit to private equity firm

NEW YORK — PPG Industries plans to lay off about 1,800 employees amid efforts to cut costs, with the paints and coatings maker also inking a deal to sell a sizeable chunk of its architectural coatings business.

Pittsburgh-based PPG said Thursday the job cuts would primarily impact positions in the U.S. and Europe.

Mark Silvey, PPG's director of corporate communications, said 800 people work at its corporate headquarters in Downtown Pittsburgh and another 425 at its facility in Cranberry.

PPG's plant in Springdale produces industrial coatings. Silvey did not include the number of employees who work there in his response to a request for information from

PPG also announced it has agreed to sell all of its U.S. and Canadian architectural coatings business — which houses brands like Liquid Nails, Glidden and Olympic and made up \$2 billion in net sales for PPG last year — to private equity firm American Industrial Partners. The sale, expected to close late this year or in early 2025, is valued at \$550 million.

Silvey noted the Springdale operation is not part of the architectural coatings business and is not included in that sale.

In August, PPG agreed to sell its silicas products business to Poland-based QEMETICA

JERUSALEM — Israeli forces in Gaza killed Hamas leader Yahya Sinwar, a chief architect of last year's attack on Israel that sparked the war, the military said Thursday. Troops appeared to have run across him unknowingly in a battle, only to discover afterward that a body in the rubble was Israel's most wanted man.

Israeli leaders celebrated his kill-

"The Secret Service as an agency requires fundamental reform to carry out its mission," the authors wrote Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas of the Homeland Security Department, the Secret Service's parent agency, in a letter accompanying their report. "Without that reform, the Independent Review Panel believes another Butler can and will happen again."

One rallygoer, Corey Comperatore of Buffalo Township, was killed and two others were seriously wounded when Thomas Matthew Crooks climbed onto the roof of a nearby building and opened fire as Trump spoke.
