Greenville County GOP calls for censures

Critics: Actions against five individuals amount to political stunts

Voting has started to determine whether Greenville County Republicans will censure four sitting office-holders and a special elections candidate.

Party leaders called a meeting on Oct. 9 to introduce the censure of Lt. Gov. Pamela Evette, county council members Dan Tripp, Joey Russo and Liz Seman, and Dianne Mitchell, a Republican candidate for the South Carolina House District 21 in a special election. A censure is a formal statement of disapproval for an official or their actions.

Members were given until 2 p.m. on Oct. 10 to submit an online vote on their decisions. The censure, signaling a continued party rift, needs to pass a second vote before it is finalized. That vote was scheduled to take place during the regular Greenville County Republican Party meeting on Oct. 13.

The Greenville County Republicans drafted a censure of Evette on claims that she has failed to support the Make America Great Again/America First Movement in South Carolina. The group claims that Evette has not been

The empty store spaces at Greenville's Haywood Mall are getting new retailers in 2026.

The new year will bring four new retailers to the mall's selections, including a popular clothing brand and a Japanese eatery.

"It just really speaks to the strength

of Greenville as a retail destination for these major brands and Haywood Mall is the destination in Greenville that they are all looking to come to," said Brandi Crowe, marketing and business development director at the Haywood Mall, in a statement to the media. "Especially coming out of COVID, I think people have really leaned into shopping as more of a social activity. We've just seen Haywood Mall continue to grow and retailer demand is strong. Each brand re-

flects something our guests care about, whether it's wellness, style, or local pride. Together, they reinforce Haywood's role as a vibrant destination where people come to shop, connect, and feel at home."

A clothing store will also expand its footprint at the mall, with a grand re-opening slated for late October 2025.
