US envoy called in reponse to claims of spying

Americans accused of running 'covert' actions in Greenland

Denmark summoned the head of the U.S. Embassy on Wednesday after allegations emerged that three Americans with close ties to President Donald Trump were running "covert influence operations" in Greenland.

Trump has repeatedly said that he wants to "get" Greenland, a huge, strategically important island, mostly in the Arctic, that is a territory of Denmark.

Within hours of the allegations, published by Denmark's main public broadcaster Wednesday morning, the Danish Foreign Ministry summoned the current head of the embassy, the chargé d'affaires, for a meeting.

"We are aware that foreign actors continue to show an interest in Greenland," said Lars Lokke Rasmussen, Denmark's foreign minister, in a statement Wednesday. "Any attempt to interfere in the internal affairs of the kingdom will of course be unacceptable."

Rasmussen called the summons a "preventive conversation."

The allegations followed reports this spring that U.S. intelligence agencies were stepping up spying operations in Greenland, news that had also created a stir in Denmark.

VACCINATION RATES CONTINUE TO DECLINE

PERCENTAGE OF KINDERGARTEN IMMUNIZATIONS IN COUNTY AMONG LOWEST IN STATE

Kindergarten immunization rates in Tennessee fell for a fourth straight year to a record low 92.3%, with Hamilton County falling among the least vaccinated counties in the state, according to a statewide report.

Hamilton was one of 15 Tennessee counties that had fewer than 90% of its kindergarteners fully immunized during the 2024-25 school year. The Tennessee Department of Health cat-

egorizes immunization rates that fall below that mark as "places the community at increased risk."

Kindergartners in Hamilton County were 88.4% vaccinated, a decrease from 89.1% the year before. Nearby Grundy County had the lowest immunization rate in the state at 78.7%.

The figures come from an annual report by the Tennessee Department of Health outlining the coverage and exemption rates of the six vaccines required by law for children to attend kindergarten. Students must be upto-date on the vaccinations for measles, mumps, polio, tetanus, whooping cough and chickenpox.

The report includes both public and private schools. Statewide, the immunization rate of public schools is higher than that of private schools at 92.6% and 87.2%, respectively. The state report is compiled from data submitted by schools. The reports are voluntary for the private schools, and roughly half of private schools responded.

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
Commission members repay some travel funds

Hamilton County Commissioner Gene-o Shipley, R-Soddy-Daisy, stood up from his seat on the dais Wednesday morning and handed auditor Chris McCollough a check for \$462.

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Trump tells states to take gender identity out of sex ed

Much of nation at risk of losing funds if mandate is ignored

The Trump administration is threatening to pull federal funding from 40 states for a sex education program aimed at vulnerable teens unless those states remove references in their curriculum to gender identity and transgender people.

In a Tuesday press release, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services said the action reflected the Trump administration's "ongoing commitment to protecting children from attempts to indoctrinate them with delusional ideology."

The threat comes after California refused to change

its curriculum last week and Health and Human Services terminated the state's nearly

\$6 million-a-year grant. The states that received notices to change their curriculum are: Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Georgia, Hawaii, Illinois, Iowa, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Utah, Vermont, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin and Wyoming.
