TxDOT event offers child safety tips, free car seats

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) held a Safety Day event at the Texas Information Center in Amarillo on Friday, Aug. 22, for interested people to attend. At the event, staff performed car seat inspections to make sure children were as safe as possible in their cars. Visitors also had a chance to take home a free car seat during the event, which lasted from 10 a.m. to 2

TxDOT employee LaVisa Matthews said many people use the "booster" seat

for their children too long. "They shouldn't be in a booster after they reach 4 years old and 40 pounds," she

Staff demonstrated the "rollover convincer" to the crowd to show how dangerous a rollover can be to a child, or adult, who isn't properly strapped in with a seat belt. During the demonstration, a child-sized mannequin in the vehicle cab came tumbling out, as the cab spun over and over, simulating a dangerous crash.

"This simulates a 35-mph rollover," Matthews said. "Dad is distracted because he's been on his cell phone, he tells his kid to get in and buckle up, as parents sometimes do. And sometimes, they don't, and this is what can happen," she said as the child-sized mannequin fell out.

"There has to be a sticker on the side of every single car seat that shows the weight and height limit, but people sometimes don't pay attention to it. It's important, and the law says a child must be properly restrained," she said.

Matthews demonstrated to a woman who came wanting to see how to properly install the regular child car seat. Other people who drove up received similar instructions and asked

Dem Nair launches election campaign

In the heart of downtown Amarillo, at the bustling Crush Wine Bar and Grill, former City Council member Mark Nair stood before a crowd on Aug. 26, launching a bold campaign for Congress in Texas' 13th District.

With a "People First" agenda, Nair, a Democrat, aims to bring a fresh voice to a region long dominated by Republican control — a district so reliably red that incumbent Rep. Ronny Jackson ran unopposed in the 2024 election, securing his third term without a single challeng-

Nair, a 30-year Amarillo resident, inventor and educator, knows the odds are steep. The 13th District, stretching from the Panhandle to Denton, is a Republican stronghold rated R+26 by the Cook Political Report. In 2022, Jackson
