The Abilene State Supported Living Center's Christmas Lane, now in its 36th year, will be open nightly on the SSLC's campus. • If you've never been, visitors enter the lighted display from the gate at 2501 Maple St. in Abilene and then drive slowly through a wandering path of illuminated Christmas scenes sponsored by Big Country businesses. • The display begins after sunset, and drivers are advised to dim their lights and tune their radios to an FM frequency playing holiday music for the tour.

At the end, visitors can either exit or park and enter the Christmas Lane HQ for more Christmas fun. It will be open nightly until Dec. 24 with activities in the headquarters 6-9 p.m. during school and 6-10 p.m. on weekends and when the holiday break begins. Outdoor light displays only will be featured 6-10 p.m. Dec. 24-28.

Bill Gilliland, who has been dubbed "Mr. Christmas," is the chairman of the holiday program. He described this year's displays and what visitors can expect.

"The displays change some each year. We have some new ones, and we have some that have been here forever," he said. "Like Jackson Brothers (Feed) down here, they've been here nearly as long as we have."

At least 120 holiday displays are arranged for the event. A Santa's workshop building is a new addition to Christmas Lane.

Gilliland said volunteers put it together in time for this year's display.

And speaking of the big red guy, kids have the opportunity to call his workshop directly thanks to the North Pole Hotline phone booths outside the headquarters entrance.

Gilliland said they had set that up
