## Beaumont budget proposal shows \$7.6M spending gap

The city of Beaumont's proposed budget for fiscal year 2026 indicates that while expenditures exrevenues \$7,642,037, the budget is

council Tuesday. In the budget, the city's definition of a balanced budget states that recurring expenditures can't exceed recurring revenues. The budget estimates \$169.6 million in revenue and \$162.5 million in recurring expenditures, resulting in a balanced budget.

This means that \$14.7 million of the city's expenditures for fiscal year 2026 are one-time expenses.

A big part of these nonrecurring expenditures is the city's transfers out of the general fund, which currently is \$12.5 million. The transfers out include \$1.9 million to the transit fund, \$5.96 million to the capital reserve fund, \$5.17 million to the employee benefits fund and \$1.6 million to the general liability

All new additions to the capital reserve fund are for one-time expenses and will be used to fund facility maintenance and new additions to the city's vehicle fleet.

New additions to the general fund budget included:

As another week passes without anything noteworthy coming out of the Atlantic and into the Gulf, those with the means are taking forecasts and using them to build resources to help others.

The Coca-Cola South-

west Beverages facility in Beaumont has routinely followed forecast coverage. Recently, the facility re-positioned over 40,000 cases of bottled water as part of its hurricane readiness plan.

According to leadership, the team has made proactive storm prep a core part of operations,

both to protect employees and support local communities since seeing the level of crisis caused by storms like Tropical Storm Harvey.

"There was water probably halfway up my calf when I walked into the building," distribution supervisor James Ward said. "As soon as the storm had passed, we were all communicating with each other and decided to come up here and check on the place. I just couldn't believe it. I've never seen anything like it."
