Crumbl Cookies grand opening set for July 10

Cookie chain Crumbl is coming to Corpus Christi.

The bakery will hold a grand opening 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. on July 10, featuring T-shirts and stickers for the first 100 customers, a gift with each in-store purchase while supplies last and a raffle to win free cookies for a year, according to a news release from the business.

The business is located at 4938 S. Staples St., Suite D14, in Corpus Christi in The Shops at La Palmera.

Crumbl is a dessert franchise that began in Utah in 2017. It now has more than 1,100 locations across the U.S. The menu rotates each week, with weekly flavor lineups announced every Sunday on social media.

The business will be open 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Saturday. It will be closed Sundays.

According to crumblcookies.com, the July 5-11 menu includes a marbled stuffed cheesecake cookie, a birthday cake cookie featuring Oreos, a strawberry ice cream bar cookie, a Biscoff skillet cookie, a snickerdoodle cupcake cookie, a caramel shortbread cookie featuring Twix and s'mores cookie thins. Pink sugar cookies, chocolate chip cookies, brownie batter cookies and s'mores cookies are always on the menu.

The new location is owned by siblings Riley, Kelly and Kolby Rawlings and cousin Channing Hemsley.

ICE officer fatally shoots immigrant in Houston

Federal immigration enforcement officers shot and killed a Mexican immigrant in Houston on July 7 according to Immigration and Customs Enforcement officials.

Lorenzo Salgado Araujo was fatally shot by ICE officers after they attempted to pull him over in a "targeted enforcement operation" in the Texas city's East End neighborhood shortly before 7 a.m. local time, according to an agency spokesperson.

ICE officials alleged Salgado Araujo "attempted to evade arrest" and "weaponized his vehicle in an attempt to run over" an officer. The individual fired "his weapon in self-defense," the spokesperson said. Salgado Araujo was transported to a hospital where he died.

USA TODAY has reached out to the

Department of Homeland Security for more information on what prompted ICE officers to pursue Salgado Araujo.

The League of United Latin American Citizens, a prominent Latino civil rights group, said they had been in contact with Salgado Araujo's son, Ronaldo. According to family, Salgado Araujo was killed as he was starting his work day.

Two workers who were with him were detained during the incident, said LULAC, citing family. The group said they are offering a \$5,000 reward for information that leads either to the indictment or exoneration of the officer behind the shooting.

Salgado Araujo's family said the man was in the process of becoming a U.S. citizen. USA TODAY has also reached out to DHS for comment on the man's
