Police union vows legal action over recall ruling

A police union president said Thursday "multiple parties" would take legal action against the city after it declared a recall petition against Mayor Dedrick Johnson to be insufficient.

The city on Wednesday eve-

ning declared a recall effort against Johnson dead, saying the petition had "multiple and significant non-compliances" with both the city charter and state election law.

Galveston sets budget bigger than no-newrevenue can fund

A spit city council voted Thursday to increase a proposed \$256.6 million budget - signaling a majority rejection of a no-new-revenue tax rate — to allow for employee pay increases and a replenishment of the city's reserve fund balance, a top concern among some members.

The change would require setting a tax increase that would
