Arkansas man killed in Monday causeway crash

Police on Tuesday identified the driver killed Monday afternoon when a Jeep ran into the back of a flatbed truck on the Galveston causeway as Lonnie Kramer, 76, of Arkansas.

As i45NOW first reported, Kramer was killed after rear-ending a flatbed truck about 1:45 p.m. Monday in the northbound lanes of Interstate 45 at the base of the Galveston causeway.

The online news service also reported a

small passenger vehicle carrying a woman and children sustained minor damage, and another vehicle struck a retaining wall while attempting to avoid the crash area.

Bonnie Thomas, who was traveling north at the time, narrowly avoided striking the flatbed truck herself as traffic approached the causeway from Harborside Drive, she said.

"The flatbed truck was stopped in the middle lane," Thomas said. "I barely missed hitting it. I thought it was a tow truck that had broken down."

Galveston council to hear Elissa voyage details

The city council will hear additional details Thursday about how the 1877 tall ship Elissa would be crewed, staffed and oper-

ated during a proposed East Coast voyage before voting on whether to approve a \$750,000 tourism investment tied to the national Sail250 celebration.

The Park Board of Trustees voted unanimously in January to approve a budget amendment authorizing up to \$750,000 from

tourism development reserves to include Elissa in Sail250, an international gathering of tall ships commemorating the nation's 250th anniversary.

The event would culminate with a July 4 appearance in New

Port studies elevated road to clear chokepoints

For decades, traffic bound for the Port of Galveston has had to navigate a familiar set

of obstacles: railroad crossings that halt vehicles without warning, low-lying roads that flood during moderate rain and an aging surface street network asked to carry both cruise passengers and heavy industrial cargo.

Now, port officials are studying whether an elevated roadway from Interstate 45 could bypass many of those choke points altogether — a project that,
