Courthouse progresses despite weather days; county OKs fifth floor work

onstruction of the new Smith County Courthouse remains on track despite record-breaking rain. This week, a recently approved expansion plan will add a couple additional months to the timeline of Phase 2 which is still expected to be complete by the end of 2026.

While the original construction plan remained on track to finish next fall, commissioners on Tuesday approved a fifth floor partial finish-out plan, moving the second phase's anticipated completion date to December 2026. The addition comes at no extra cost to taxpayers.

county's weekly meeting.

Barr said the team recently experienced 113 weather days due to the

above average 66 inches of rain, but the project remains on time thanks to crews working overtime and bringing in more staff,

resulting in the completed concrete structure a week in advance. An average of 220 workers are on the construction site daily,

Barr said.

"Every day we are going to keep working hard to push forward and not give up," Barr said. "Our attitude is we can't control the weather, but we can control how we respond to that, and so we try to keep a positive attitude.'

County Judge Neal Franklin said he continues to be impressed with the project's scope, including the team's transparent updates for the court and community.

"One thing that I have really appreciated about Hoar Construction in our meetings is y'all call the challenges opportunities and it's always kept really positive in our meetings and moving forward," Franklin said, commenting on previous weather concerns. "We appreciate that."
