Chatham First plans second annual community nighttime event

Danville football family grows the next generation of athletes

It all begins about halfway through the high school football season.

That's when Jerry "JD" Edmunds starts to scout the social media feeds to see who's creating conversations.

As the scholarship chair for the 1 Dream One Team organization, he's looking for the next selections.

He'll keep watch over them for the rest of the season by keeping in contact with coaches.

But it isn't just about student-athletes. He's looking for the "total package" with academics as a component.

"We want the young man to be a representation of their school and community," he told the Register & Bee.

The 1 Dream One Team is a partnership between Kenny Lewis' Danville Church & Community Tutorial Program and My Brother's Keeper, an organization forged by Trey, Terrell and Tremaine Edmunds, who are either current or former NFL players.

The three football brothers are also known as the Eboyz.

"Our main goal is to grow kids," Ferrell Edmunds, father of the family trio, told the newspaper in a Sunday interview.
