Trump: Sides 'closer than ever' to peace

He hosts Zelenskyy in Florida following phone call with Putin

PALM BEACH, Fla. - President Donald Trump on Sunday insisted Ukraine and Russia are "closer than ever before" to a President Volodymyr Zelenskyy at his Florida resort, but he acknowledged the negotiations are complex and could still break down, leaving the war dragging on for years.

The president's statements came after the leaders met for

talks following what Trump said was an "excellent," 2 1/2-hour phone conversation with Russian President Vladimir Putin, whose invasion of Ukraine launched the war nearly four years ago. Trump insisted he believed Putin still wants peace, even as Russia launched another round of attacks on Ukraine while Zelenskyy flew to the United States for the latest round of negotiations.

"Russia wants to see Ukraine peace deal as he hosted Ukrainian succeed," Trump said during a late afternoon news conference as he stood with Zelenskyy after their meeting. He repeatedly praised his counterpart as "brave."

ELECTION 2026 Reeves drops out of Senate contest

GOP now lacking name recognition in bid to unseat Warner

State Sen. Bryce Reeves, R-Orange, announced Sunday that he is dropping his 2026 bid to oust U.S. Sen. Mark Warner, D-Va., citing "a serious family health matter."

Reeves' departure from the contest leaves the GOP – as yet - with no challenger Warner who has significant name recognition.

"A serious family health matter and the realities of timing require my full attention at home. My faith and my family come first," Reeves said in a post on X.

"I remain fully committed to serving the citizens of Virginia's 28th Senatorial District and look forward to seeking re-election to my Senate seat in 2027. My work continues in the General Assembly to protect our AAA bond rating, strengthen our economy, and ensure Virginia remains the best place in America for our military and veterans."

The remaining announced candidates for the GOP U.S. Senate nomination are Kim Farington of Fairfax County, who

Physicians top list of highest earners

Salaries of 4,500 county employees up by a combined \$30M

This year, Henrico County's 4,500 employees are set to collectively earn \$361,721,180, according to payroll records obtained by The Times-Dispatch through a Virginia Freedom of Information Act request.

That's roughly \$30 million more than last year, distributed across 162 more employees — even as county officials cut the real estate tax rate by 2 cents and the personal property tax rate by 5 cents.

Five of the seven highest-paid employees are physicians, the
