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Photos released from Epstein estate

House Democrats include images of Trump and Clinton

WASHINGTON — House Democrats released a selection of photos from the estate of Jeffrey Epstein on Friday, including some of President Donald Trump, former President Bill Clinton and the former Prince Andrew.

The dozens of photos released by Democratic lawmakers on the House Oversight Committee were a small part of more than 95,000 they received from the estate of Epstein, who died in a New York jail cell in 2019 while awaiting trial on sex trafficking charges. The photos released Friday were separate from the case files that the Department of Justice is now under compulsion to release, but anticipation is growing as the Trump administration faces a deadline next week

to produce the Epstein files that have been the source of conspiracy theories and speculation for years.

The president said he hadn't seen the photos from Epstein's estate released Friday, but they were "no big deal." Trump added that Epstein was "all over Palm Beach" and had "photos with everybody."

Beaver, along with ODU

Youngkin: Planned facility is historic

Governor calls \$689M plant the largest capital investment in region

RICHMOND — South Korean company LS Cable and System plans to build a manufacturing facility in Chesapeake, providing what Gov. Glenn Youngkin called the "single largest capital investment in the history of the Hampton Roads region."

The complex will house three different businesses: Copper rod production from copper recycling, magnet wire manufacturing and rare-earth magnet production. The company's \$689 million investment is expected to create 430 jobs.

"The supply of the rare earth components that go into particularly magnets that are used in a lot of our sophisticated weapon systems come from China," Youngkin told reporters Friday. "Therefore, we have a massive risk in the United States for that supply chain. It's why this particular investment is so important, because it creates a secure supply chain with trusted allies for these most critical components."

The announcement comes as the United States and other countries are trying to decrease reliance on China, which manufactures the bulk of rare earth magnets but has in recent months suspended their export. The magnets are used in products such as drones and cars.

"We are literally laying the foundation for what promises to be a long and meaningful relationship between our friends from South Korea, your gateway to the United States, and our fair city," said Chesapeake Mayor Rick West.

LS Cable and System leaders hope the company will break ground on the facility mid next year and be fully operational by late 2027.

LS Greenlink, a subsidiary of LS Cable and System, already broke ground on a massive underwater cable factory in Chesapeake this year. That \$681 million, 750,000-square-foot manufacturing plant is expected to create more than 330 jobs and will feature the tallest building in Virginia. It is expected to be complete in 2028.

The recycling component of the new facility will function as a supplier to the Greenlink project.

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Hampton revokes restaurant's permit

Police say they've had nearly 100 calls since Karma first opened

HAMPTON — City Council unanimously voted Wednesday to revoke a use permit for Karma Restaurant and Lounge after several violent incidents this year have stretched police resources to monitor the area.

The revocation means the business, along Lincoln Street downtown, can no longer host live entertainment or serve alcohol, but it could continue to operate as a restaurant, according to interim Deputy Director of Community Development Steven Lynch.

It's the second recent permit revocation for a Hampton bar this year after Chances Restau-

rant and Lounge lost its use permit for similar security incidents in October.

Karma received its first use permit in January 2024 to operate until 2 a.m. daily. Hamp-
