DEVELOPER BACKS OUT OF THORPE ROAD HOUSING PLAN

Conservationists call off legal action after Blue Fern exits controversial land deal near Latah Valley

Local conservationists are celebrating after a Redmond, Washington-based developer unexpectedly pulled out of plans to build 1,000 homes in an undeveloped, wooded area along U.S. Highway 195 near Thorpe Road.

It may only be a temporary reprieve, however. Advocates will have two years to try to find a permanent solution to keep the land available to the public, or else it may once again be made available for housing development.

Blue Fern Development has been in the news frequently in recent months for two adjoining 1,000-home proposals in the Latah Valley.

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Annual survey shows decrease in county homeless population

The number of homeless people in Spokane County fell by 10.6% last year.

The findings are based on the 2025 point-in-time count conducted in January when teams fan out to count and question Spokane County's homeless population on a particular night. This year's count found

1,806 people living on the streets or in shelters.

It was the second consecutive year that showed a decline

While homelessness in Spokane dropped overall, the number of people living without shelter during January rose to 617 from 443 a year earlier, while the number of homeless people staying in shelters fell

lodge Park closes

North Rim for remainder ofseason

A historic lodge in Grand Canyon National Park was one of dozens of structures destroyed by a wildfire in northern Arizona that has prompted evacuations and forced the closure of the North Rim to visitors for the remainder of the 2025 season, authorities said Sunday.

The Grand Canyon Lodge - the only lodging inside the park at the North Rim - was consumed by the Dragon Bravo fire, a blaze sparked earlier this month that had engulfed 5,000 acres and destroyed at least 50 structures as of Sunday. It was burning about 35 miles south from the bigger White Sage fire, which was "experiencing rapid growth" to the north and east Sunday after erupting last week near Arizona's border with Utah.

The White Sage fire had burned more than 40,000 acres by Sunday, doubling in size from the previous day. Firefighters had yet to get containment around any of the perimeter of
