## Future of Ritzville hospital in doubt

State audit says East Adams Rural Healthcare facility lost \$12.2 million between 2021 and 2023

The future of East Adams Rural Healthcare remains precarious, according to a state auditor's report released this week.

Though a plan recently was nances for years. approved to save the Ritzville hospital, East Adams remains at risk of closure. Former administrators allegedly kept the hospital district board in the dark about the hospital's faltering fi-

The state audit found the hospital lost \$12.2 million between 2021 and 2023. Losses increased over the course of those three years: \$2.6 million in 2021, \$3.1 million in 2022 and \$6.5 million

The three-year period also found a precipitous decline of its cash-on-hand reserves, which estimates how long a hospital can continue running without more revenue coming

in. According to the audit, those reserves dropped from 189 days in 2021 to 25 days in 2023. The state audit said the reserves dropped further to 10 days in

**HUNDREDS LINE UP** AT SPOKANE STORES FOR DEALS BEFORE DAWN

Scott said they hurried home for blankets and extra jackets before heading back to the store, which opened at 6 a.m.

It was their first Black Friday in person, she added, since they typically stick to online deals. At Kohl's at NorthTown Mall, roughly 200 people waited outside before the store's opening at 5 a.m., many hoping to snag the special giveaway. Each store handed out a "Kohl's

## The victims

The two National Guard members, shot Wednesday afternoon a few blocks from the White House, were identified as Andrew Wolfe, 24, and Sarah Beckstrom, 20, both members of the West Virginia National Guard.

Beckstrom died Thursday of her injuries, West Virginia Gov.

Patrick Morrisey announced. "She answered the call to serve, stepped forward willingly, and carried out her mission with the strength and character that define the very best of the West Virginia National Guard," Morrisey posted on X. "Today, we honor her bravery and her sacrifice as we mourn the loss of a young woman who gave everything she had in defense of others.'

Wolfe was in critical condition.
