Former church transformed into clothing boutique, market

SUN PRAIRIE — Instead of a baptismal font, rows of pews and a pipe organ, there are blouses, sweaters and blue jeans.

In the basement, where decades ago the ladies of the First Methodist Episcopal Church served up funeral luncheons and hosted potluck dinners, stand shelves, coolers and freezers filled with jams, pasta, pickles, meats, pizza, produce and cheese primarily made in Wisconsin.

The bats have been excommunicated from the belfry and the honey bees from the walls of this Romanesque Revival church, constructed in 1867 on a rise overlooking this city's downtown.

And just like the transformation of this former farming community into a thriving suburb with two high schools and more than 40,000 residents, Jennifer Lee's vision for this historic church property has been realized.

Just over a year ago, after completing an \$860,000 renovation, Lee opened Faded

US captures Venezuelan leader in military strike

Trump says US will run country for now, tap vast oil reserves

CARACAS, Venezuela — The United States captured Venezuelan President Nicolás Maduro and flew him out of the country in a military operation early Saturday, plucking a sitting leader from

office after months of escalating pressure on the oil-rich South American nation.

A plane believed to be carrying the deposed leader landed late Saturday afternoon in New York, where he was expected to face criminal charges.

President Donald Trump said the U.S. government would run the country at least temporarily and tap Venezuela's vast oil reserves to sell "large amounts" to other countries.
