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# **Register now** for UW's pesticide applicator training, certification

#### **CHIPPEWA COUNTY EXTENSION OFFICE**

The University of Wisconsin's Private Pesticide Applicator Training and Certification Program has announced updates to its training and certification process for 2026. In-person training sessions and testing opportunities will be available in January, February and March across Chippewa, Dunn and Eau Claire counties.

All participants must purchase a training manual before attending any training or taking the certification exam. Manuals are available only through the UW Pesticide Applicator Training (PAT) state office in Madison and not at local Extension offices. Manuals cost \$43 and include a unique PAT Number required for certification. Orders can be placed online at https://patstore.wisc.edu/ secure/collection/private/17. Delivery takes five to 10 days, with rush shipping available for an additional fee.

# **Training options**

Participants must choose one of the following training options after purchasing a manual:

# 1. Online video training

This self-paced option covers the same material as in-person sessions and is available for the General Farm category. Participants have 14 days to complete the training once started. You will receive one completion certificate that must be shown to the test proctor to be graded at 50%. A completion certificate must be presented to the test proctor. You will need to take the Exam in person at a participating County Extension Office or online with Pearson VUE (see item 4.). # 2. Live training/review sessions
