# PEOPLE for 19 DECADES

Starting Thursday, Aug. 14, and continuing each Thursday through Dec. 18, The Gazette is celebrating its 180th birthday by taking a decade by decade look at the people who have most shaped Janesville history.

We'll share the stories of 19 people — 1 person for each of the 19 decades that The Gazette has touched since it began publishing, from the 1840s to the 2020s.

When we sat down to choose 19 honorees, we knew it wouldn't be easy. Every decade produced more than one person who made an outsized difference.

Ultimately, we picked for this honor people who made such a lasting impact ists themselves.

in a particular decade, that their accomplishment continues to locally reverberate today.

For the most recent decades, we considered how a person's accomplishments might continue to ripple far into the future. We considered that a person could accomplish great things — in fact, could become quite famous — but not benefit Janesville's long-term course much, or at all.

The 19 people we've chosen have been business and labor leaders, community organizers, advocates, elected officials, supporters of the arts and artists themselves.

### George S. Parker

or more than a century, Janesville was known worldwide as the home of the Parker Pen Company.

When a stranger asked a Janesville resident what the city was noted for, "Parker pens" was a good answer.

With thousands of employees working in Janesville and international distribution, Parker Penset, throughout the 20th Century, the gold standard for fine writing instruments.

But what became the largest pen

manufacturer in the world developed from a humble start.

The company was incorporated in 1892, spurred by the individual efforts of founder George Safford Parker, and through his deep connections with people in the Janesville community who trusted — and financially backed — his vision.

George S. Parker officially launched his quest to make a better fountain pen in 1892, about four years after he came up with the idea for the business while living in a small apartment at the Myers House hotel at Main and Milwaukee streets in downtown Janesville.

## Executive director: Children's museum on track to open next year
