Northeastern Wisconsin home sales remain muted in 2025

Interest rates continue to garner the attention as the summer home sales season winds down in Green Bay, Appleton and Oshkosh.

Northeastern Wisconsin home sales remain muted in 2025 in spite of positive trends in both interest rates and inventory, according to data published by the Wisconsin Realtors Association.

"All of our measures of inventory improved in July, which continues a general trend we've seen since April," WRA CEO Tom Larson said in a news release.

"Addressing the inventory shortage is key to improving sales and moderating the rapid appreciation of prices."

The region's median price increases have fallen below 5% in recent months in response to improving inventories locally and statewide, according to WRA.

Existing sales in the Appleton and Oshkosh areas are up 1.7% and 0.9%, respectively, through July while Green Bay area sales are down 5.8%. Green Bay- and Fox Cities-area Realtors said sales have not increased this summer quite like they hoped and expected in part due to a shortage of homes in affordable price ranges and general uncertainty, even as more buyers adjust to

market conditions.

"A lot of people who don't have to move aren't pulling the trigger," said AmyJo Fullerton, a Green Bay area Realtor who exclusively works with buyers. "Buyers looking at homes under \$500,000 have adjusted to interest rates. If they're ready to buy, they're ready to buy."
