Report for future Robertson Road development released

Although consultants are nearing completion on the Robertson Road Corridor Study, potential changes may still be years

Community members were able to see recommendations from the consultants Aster Street, consultants recommend infor the first time Tuesday night at the Fort Caspar open house.

Casper, Mills, HDR Engineering, Natrona County, the Wyoming Department of Transportation and the Metropolitan Planning Organization all worked together on the study.

Robertson Road is a main pass through corridor between Paradise Valley and Mills. It also has thousands of residents living in neighborhoods that only feed out to it.

The study originally started in May with have studied traffic congestions, public concerns, speed data, historical information and alternative solutions.

Recommendations

The plan recognized four intersections that needed change. Each of these intersections offered its own challenges, so not all of the same solutions could be used in each area.

For the intersection at CY Avenue and stalling dual left turn lanes. This area already has a traffic light.

The Trevett Lane recommendation is a single lane roundabout. Several attendees placed sticky notes Tuesday saying they would not like a roundabout anywhere on the road.

Buckboard Road needs a turning lane, which is actually something engineering consultants recommend be extended throughout the entire stretch of the cor-

At the Poison Spider intersection, the data collection. Since then, the consultants recommendation is a standard intersection with left and right turn lanes. Currently



Police probe river incident as case of false report

Casper Police officials announced Wednesday they are investigating the Tuesday morning report of a missing person as a case of false reporting after authorities found the purportedly missing man - 37-year-old Dexter Fightingbear - safe at his home.

After hearing he was reported missing, Fightingbear reached out to authorities in Fremont County – where

he currently lives — and Casper Police said he had been found after Fremont authorities made contact and confirmed his identity.

Casper spokeswoman Rebekah Ladd clarified in an email Wednesday that Fightingbear standard protocol for



missing persons involves checking the missing individual's residences. "The information police had at the

time of the investigation was that Fightingbear had a residence in the Casper area," Ladd wrote. After receiving a report that a man

had fallen into the North Platte River near 300 West F Street around 2 a.m. Tuesday, Natrona County Search and Rescue, Casper Police Department, Natrona County Sheriff's Office and other agencies deployed personnel, boats and drones to find the man, according to a news release issued by the department.

The response "involved nearly a dozen" agencies.

"As part of the follow-up investigation officers interviewed the reporting party at length," authorities said. "His statements were inconsistent, and evidence indicated he was under the influence of multiple substances when he placed the call."
